In unfortunate events of natural disasters or hospitalization we would be more than happy to assist you in the planning of your pet's well-being. Below is a list of items you should have ready for your pet in the event they are needed.

Emergency Supplies – Just as you would have for you and your family.

✓	Food	Keep at least 3 days of food in an airtight, waterproof container
	Water	Store at least 3 days of water specifically for your pets, in addition to water for yourself and your family.
	Medicines	Keep an extra supply of medicines your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container, as well as medical records.
	First-Aid Kit	Talk to your vet about what is important for your pets emergency medical needs. (Most kits should include cotton bandage rolls, bandage tape, scissor, antibiotic ointment, flea and tick prevention, gloves, isopropyl alcohol, saline solution etc.) It may be a good idea to include a pet first aid reference book as well as ID tags.
	Collar with ID tag, harness or Leash	Your pet should wear a collar with its rabies tag and identification at all times. Include a second leash, just in case.
	Important Documents	Place copies of your pet's registration information, adoption papers, vaccination documents and medical records in a clean plastic bag or waterproof container and add to your kit.
	Crate or Pet Carrier	If you need to evacuate in an emergency situation take your pets with you, provided it's practical to do so.
	Sanitation	Include pet litter and litter box if appropriate, newspapers, paper towels, plastic bags and bleach to provide your pets sanitation needs. You can use bleach as a disinfectant (dilute 9 parts water to 1 part bleach)
	A Picture of you and your pet together	If you become separated from your pet during an emergency, a picture of you and your pet together will help you prove ownership and allow others in assisting you in identifying your pet. Include information about species, breed, age, sex, color and distinguishing characteristics.
	Familiar Items	Favorite toys, treats or bedding. Favorite items can help reduce stress for your pet.
	Consider 2 kits	In one, put everything your pets will need to stay where you are and make it on your own. The other should be lightweight, smaller version you can take with you if you and your pets have to get away.

Plan in advance what you will do in an emergency. Be prepared to assess the situation. Use common sense and whatever you have on hand to take care of yourself and ensure your pet's safety during an emergency.
